## HDHS \#3: Las Fechas

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The days of the week in Spanish are named after celestial bodies and religion.

$\square$ The days of the week are all masculine, because the word día is masculine. To say "on Monday," use the definite article "el" plus the name of the day: el lunes. When written, they are in lower case, unless they are the first word in a sentence.

With the exception of the Spanish name for January - enero - the names of the months are very similar to the English names, since they are all derived from Latin. They are also all masculine because the word mes (month) is masculine. The names of the months in Spanish are:

| enero | January | mayo | May | septiembre | September |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| febrero | February | junio | June | octubre | October |
| marzo | March | julio | July | noviembre | November |
| abril | April | agosto | August | diciembre | December |

¿Qué fecha es hoy? What is today's date? To write the date in Spanish, follow this formula:

> Hoy es , el de de .

NOTE: For the first of the month, "uno" is not used. You must use the ordinal number "first" which is primero. The same is true for the "second" of the month, or segundo.

When writing the date in numerical form, it is slightly different. The date is written using the date first, then the month, followed by the year. If you are familiar with military dates, it is done the same way.

When speaking of dates you might find these seasonal words helpful:

| invierno | winter | verano | summer |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| primavera | spring | otoño | fall |
